Coraki ready to take on other rural towns across NSW in 2018

Coraki has stepped up to the challenge and is readying itself to take on four other rural towns across NSW in the 2018 Healthy Town Challenge.

The Coraki community is planning to make 2018 the “Year of Living Healthily” and will receive a \$15,000 grant towards activities and resources that make healthy eating and physical activity easier in the town.



The winner of the Healthy Town Challenge will receive an additional \$5,000 from this joint initiative of the NSW Heart Foundation and the NSW Office of Preventive Health.

The Healthy Town Challenge will run from the end of January 2018 until early August.

“Local residents will choose programs and events that they think will help them lead more active lives and eat healthier diets. This may include cooking programs, sporting sessions and community games,” explains Jillian Adams, Health Promotion Manager for the Northern NSW Local Health District.

“In addition, improvements to the town will be made to increase walkability, and make it easier for people to be physically active. We are working with a number of individuals, local groups and organisations, including Richmond Valley Council.”

Ships carrying passengers and goods travelled to and from Sydney twice a week and smaller steamers plied trade in and out of Coraki every day. Because the river was too shallow upstream all goods and passengers had to be taken to and from Casino by the smaller craft.

Boat owners Yabsley and Yeager were very competitive for business and price wars were quite the norm.

The North Coast Steam Navigation Company was under the direction of captain John Storey for many years. There were many buildings, wharves and loading ramps along the river bank.

Bonus for boaties

A favourite local pass-time, going out on our magnificent Richmond River is about to become safer and easier courtesy of \$222,000 in grants from the NSW Liberals and Nationals Government.

\$122,000 will be spent to extend the jetty at Coraki Riverside Park along with a new pontoon and gangway next to the existing boat ramp to improve access and safety when launching vessels.

\$100,000 will be invested at Woodburn for a new floating pontoon and gangway and provide a rock groyne upstream of the jetty to create a safe boating area at the beach and around the new jetty.

More jobs for the Richmond Valley

A Richmond Valley business has secured NSW Government funding under its Jobs for NSW initiative that will enable part of a \$938,000 business expansion project which is set to create up to 18 new jobs in the region.

The funding will enable Trac International, a Bungawalbyn-based business to expand and give the local economy a welcome boost. Trac International has developed an innovative rope and harness system for anyone working at heights. I tried the system myself and felt safe.

Extra \$100 per child

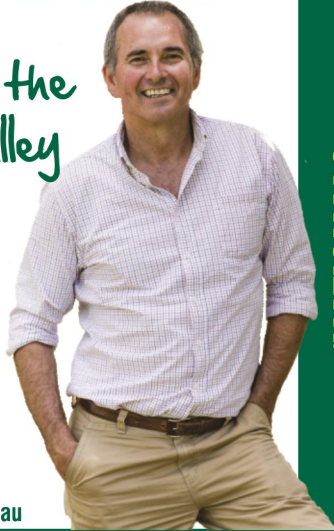

Speech Pathology Services for Children 0-5yrs

My name is Casandra Tibika and I am a Speech Pathologist who works with children. I work part time (Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays) at Coraki HealthOne and Evans Community Health Centres.

What do Speech Pathologists do?

Speech pathologists can provide assessment and therapy to help children with communication and swallowing difficulties. Speech pathologists can diagnose and treat difficulties with;

Speaking – talking clearly, using speech sounds, using words and talking in sentences

Listening & understanding – understanding questions and instructions

Reading and writing - building skills for later reading, writing and spelling

Social Skills - taking turns and making eye contact

Stuttering – talking fluently without repetitions, halting or pauses

Voice – using your voice to communicate

Feeding - swallowing food and drink safely, breast or bottle feeding, transitioning to solids

When to see a Speech Pathologist?

You can see a speech pathologist if you have any concerns with your child's communication or feeding ability. Some examples of when to see a speech pathologist are;

If your child's speech sounds different to children of a similar age. Your child may leave out sounds or use incorrect sounds

If you find it hard to understand what your child is saying or trying to communicate

If your child uses very few words

If your child does not appear to hear or respond to your voice

If your child does not appear to understand questions and instruction.

If your child is stuttering

If your child has an unusual voice or very 'rough' voice quality

If your child is coughing when eating or drinking
Who can access the service?

Any child who is not yet attending school and who is not yet accessing speech pathology through another service (eg. private therapy, NDIS, early intervention services).

How do I access the service?

You don't need a formal referral. Please contact Coraki HealthOne on 6683 9000 to discuss your concerns. This is a free service.

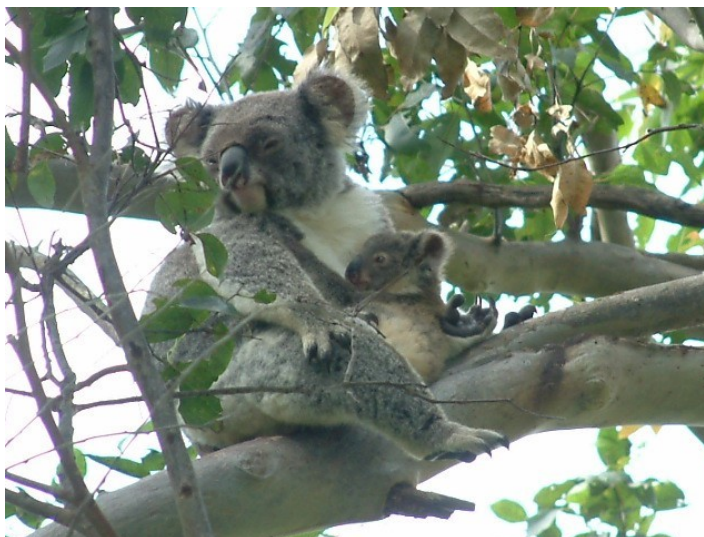

Your Priorities – Coraki Riverfront Upgrade

Richmond Valley Council wants your suggestions for priorities for the \$355,000 set aside for redevelopment and upgrade of the Coraki riverfront precinct programmed for the 2018/19 financial year.

Council is looking for feedback regarding key elements of the existing Master Plan, and what the community see as most important in the development of the park, the caravan park, and the riverfront.

Interested community members are invited to an information session focusing on redevelopment at 5.30pm, Tuesday 27 February in the CWA rooms at 61 Richmond Terrace, Coraki.

Community members can also give their priority order and suggestions for the individual projects by completing the survey available at Coraki Post Office and Coraki Takeaway.

Retail Revitalisation Project

Richmond Valley Council took part in the Retail Revitalisation Project which was made possible thanks to the Future Towns Program, a NSW State Government initiative which was run by the NSW Department of Industry. The program recognises how the quality of NSW regional main streets is critical to attracting and retaining skilled and talented people, to promoting business development and entrepreneurship, and attracting new small businesses to the community. The fund aims to improve the activation of key spaces and main streets of participating regional towns.

Consultation in Coraki showed that the challenge for local businesses is that visitors do not know their beautiful village is located just a short drive from the main road. The solution was to create a large graphic sign which highlights the features of the township and encourages visitors to stop.

The Coraki Public Information Sign, which was

installed at the end of last year, is an opportunity for the township to promote its beautiful natural scenery and capture more economic activity by diverting more vehicles and visitors from the main road.

Casino was also a part of the project with CBD businesses indicating that the vacant window fronts were detracting from the streetscape.

The concept of the Retail Revitalisation Project in Casino was to 'wrap' those vacant shopfronts with images and graphic designs which represent the kind of business which could work well in the space. So the benefit is two-fold, the vacant windows are now bright and vibrant, and they are also a positive conversation topic, an inspiration to potential businesses to come along and think about setting up in Casino.

Boating Now Program Success

Richmond Valley Council was successful in its application for funding two projects under the NSW Government Boating Now Program which supports initiatives that enhance the boating experience in NSW, including the delivery of recreational boating infrastructure across NSW waterways.

\$122,820 was received for Coraki Riverside Park with funds used to extend the existing jetty along with a new pontoon and gangway adjacent to the existing boat ramp to improve access and safety when launching vessels.

\$101,880 was received for Woodburn Riverside Park to install a new floating pontoon and gangway as well as providing a rock groyne upstream of the jetty to create a safe boating area at the beach and around the new jetty.

Richmond Valley Mayor Robert Mustow said the improvement to these waterway facilities will make access to the Richmond River more convenient for boating enthusiasts while improving safety. "It will encourage our community to enjoy our natural asset that these small villages are well known for," he said.

The Government's Boating Now program is a joint initiative with local government. Clarence MP the National's Chris Gulaptis said, "We're investing a lot of money on roads so we can get to work safely, we are also investing in our waterways so we can better enjoy our time off. It just goes to show how much we can deliver for locals when we all work together."

CORAKI COMMUNITY GRANTS PROGRAM: REMINDER ROUND 8

Given the January holiday period and the timing of this publication the Committee will consider applications received up to close of business on Tuesday 6 February. The Committee will meet to consider applications on Wednesday 7 February.

Every three months up to \$5000 is distributed by Quarry Solutions to community groups and individuals in Coraki who meet the selection criteria of the program. The four selection criteria are:

1. Community support (how much community support is there for your proposal, how can you demonstrate this: eg letters of support, sponsorship by clubs, on line surveys);
2. Benefits most people (the more people in the community who will benefit from your proposal the better your proposal will be scored against this criterion);
3. Feasibility and longevity (how can you demonstrate your capacity to carry the project through and ensure it provides ongoing benefit, what relevant experience have you had in administering projects, have you done the necessary legwork for the project - costings, quotes, etc, have you consulted other interested parties?);
4. Helps most disadvantaged (additional weighting will be given to proposals that target disadvantaged members of our community).

If there are more submissions than the available funds (\$5000 each quarter) it's the submissions that rank most highly against these criteria that will be recommended for funding. Unsuccessful applicants may resubmit in the following round. Any excess funds will be carried over to the next round.

Feedback will be given to all applicants and decisions will be published on the Committee's Facebook page, in the Pink Paper and in the Coraki and District News.

We meet in the Community Meeting Room at the Coraki Campbell HealthOne facility.

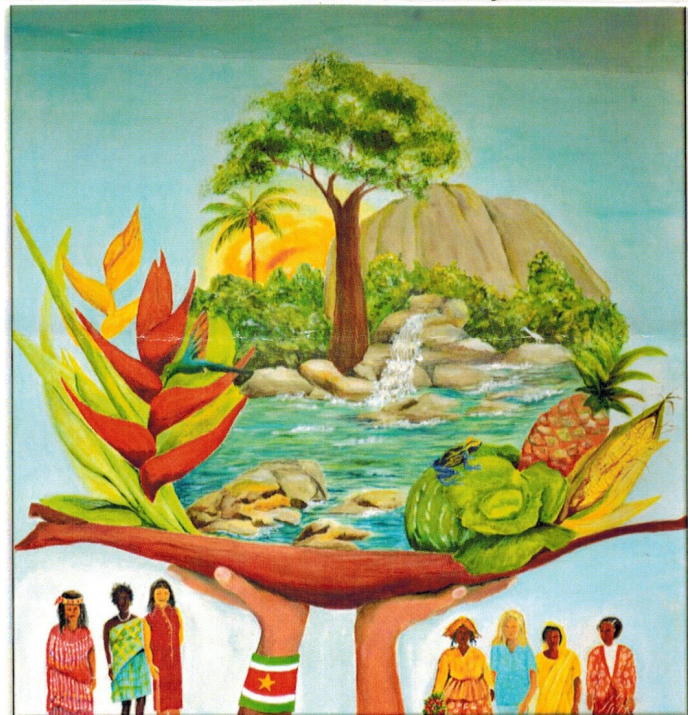
